Dear Friends,

The month of March and the first day of April have some big events for us in worship and mission and education. We have a new adult study starting in room 301-C during Sunday School on Presbyterian Beliefs, Susan Artz is leading a good new Disciple Class and more.

We have the follow up to a record breaking blood drive this month. We are carrying meals to the Community Care Clinic, food to the Clemmons Food Pantry and Storehouse for Jesus, providing worship services to area nursing homes and much more. Your gifts to the 2012 – 2017 “Growing into the next 50 years” campaign generated tremendous mission donations to some exceptional organizations. Thanks to Willie Garvin, Helen Lynde, Diane Hightower, Glen Hubbard and Stan Clarkson for doing the committee work that made these decisions happen.

In February we had a great Youth Sunday with two super worship services and we are coming up on the Choral Cantata, Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, when many guests usually come to share the praise and worship with us. I am sorry to tell you a story I heard last week from a Clemmons resident. When his family moved here shortly after the sanctuary opened, they worshipped with us. Unlike most visitors they came early and took a seat. Someone, they didn't know who, came to them and told them they were in her seat and they would have to move. Remarkably they came back a second time, closer to the start of worship. Three or four people were already seated on the pews close to the aisle. When they approached the pew no one welcomed them or moved down the pew to give them their seat, so these guests had to crawl over our knees to get to a seat at the middle of the pew.

They did not come back.

I know we are better than this. We are better hosts, we are better neighbors, and we are more welcoming people. Will you please help our New Member and Evangelism Committee, and me, by doing three things: 1. Grab your name tag when you come in and put it on. 2. Sit near the middle of your pew or row of chairs to make room for others, and 3. Take time to look for people you don't know and speak to them before you engage your friends.

Many people tell us how friendly and helpful we are, but not everyone has had that experience. Let's make it our goal to provide a Christ-like warm welcome to every person who enters our building.

Some of you have been engaging about my remarks and prayer Sunday, February 18th. As always, I am more than willing to talk with you and share our beliefs on all important issues and how our faith impacts them.

In this article the author talks about how important it is for children to be at church and be comfortable at church. Below is part of the article that I think sums up why it is good for kids to be at church!

The Benefits of Kids at Church

At church, kids will form relationships **with each other**, outside of the pressure-cooker of comparison and competition that exists in our schools. They will have the chance to interact with kids who are older and younger, who come from different schools or different communities. Knowing that the world is a bigger place than the insular world of a particular school can be liberating.


At church, kids will form relationships **with caring adults** who are involved in children and youth ministries. We aren't looking at a kid to determine their academic, athletic or artistic abilities and we are not evaluating them. We welcome them as a child of God and are always glad to see them, no matter what is going on in their lives.

At church, kids will **learn an alternate life narrative** to that which is glorified in mainstream culture. Certainly achievement and accomplishments can be very good, but learning that happiness and self-worth can be measured by metrics other than material and financial success is a valuable lesson and one that doesn't get taught in many places.

At church, kids won't just learn about God in a book, **they will experience God** in relationships and in community. They will know how it feels to seek and serve Christ in others; and feel the light of Christ in their own heart.

A Note From Patrick McElwaine

“In my own life, as winters turn into spring, I find it not only hard to cope with mud but also to credit the small harbingers of larger life to come, hard to cope until the outcome is secure. Spring teaches me to look more carefully for the green stems of possibility.” - Parker Palmer

Who really likes the winter? I feel there must be someone out there who says winter is their favorite season, but their kind are few and far between. Compared to the carefree fun of summer and the majestic leaves of fall, how can the stark cold of winter sound attractive?

Parker Palmer explores this question from a spiritual perspective in his book Let Your Life Speak: Listening to the Voice of Vocation. Compared to the spiritual vigor of summer and the abundant harvest of fall, how can the stark winter places of our lives compare? What is there to appreciate when the cold winds of life leave our spiritual trees bare and the ground frozen solid?

When winter sets in and seems here to stay, Palmer says that we are able to see our foundations all the clearer. Roots of faith anchored deep in Christ and nourished with scripture still hold firm in soil where wildflowers have long since gone. The trunks of fellow trees once hidden in foliage are revealed standing in solidarity.

To a degree Lent is a winter season, not in terms of pain but in terms of our spiritual work: stripping away all that obscures our relationship with Christ and revealing where things really stand. And as winter moves towards the spring of Easter morning, there will be signs of these 40 days' work of repentance: certainly the mud that comes with thawing snow but also, as Palmer says, “the small harbingers of life to come.” Fresh leaves, new buds, and faith that has come through the other side refined and prepared for this season's new growth. May this Lent be for each of us a time to examine our roots and prepare for the glory to come.

The Beautiful Communion Tablecloth - The year was 1994. Lewisville-Clemmons Road had only two lanes and one stop light at Hwy 158. There were only a few eating places and Interstate 40 with a tree-lined median was a rather peaceful drive to Winston-Salem. Clemmons Presbyterian was a small church with one A-frame building, and Dusty and Bob Fiedler were our husband-and-wife co-pastors. But our little church had big plans to welcome a refugee family.

On May 10, 1994 we welcomed the Sarkisov family consisting of Alex and Inessa, their son Boris, and Alex's parents Irina and Teodor. They had waited 5 years (and a long 3 years since they knew they were coming to Clemmons) until everything was approved from all sides and they were able to come directly to Clemmons. Imagine how hard it is to leave your home and settle in a new country! What possessions do you bring with you? Irina brought a tablecloth that was one of her wedding gifts purchased in the mid-50's. It was one of only a few pieces of their belongings that they were able to save when the family had to leave their home in one of the former Soviet republics, Azerbaijan, due to ethnic and religious conflict which started in 1988.

Irina decided to give the tablecloth to our church in appreciation for the kindness and warm welcome her family received. We have cherished it for many years now, using it on special occasions. So this Easter when you see our communion table draped with the beautiful white cloth, say a prayer of thanks for the Sarkisov family and all that they have contributed to our church.


